
ASSESSING EUROPE'S ENERGY CRISIS


Europe's reliance on Russian natural gas (~1/3 of Europe's total energy consumption)* has created increased energy supply concerns following Russia's invasion of Ukraine. In response, many European countries have accelerated their liquefied natural gas (LNG) inventory levels, increased LNG imports from other countries and improved LNG intake and storage infrastructure. While worst-case scenarios are always possible, alongside European fiscal stimulus and support for consumers, we believe these actions

EU NAT. GAS INVENTORIES HIGHER THAN AVERAGE


